
"You are my friend. I am going to be your friend," he promised.

#### 1. DRAMA

#### SENA AND BOBBY

The scene is set in in Africa

Cast: Narrator Grandmother Mother Sena Sister Cat

*Narrator:* There once lived a boy in Africa called Sena who was eight-and-a-half years old. When he had been much younger he had been so naughty that he could not keep a place in a nursery school for more than three days. He had been rejected by so many nurseries that his mother thought that it would be better for him to stay at home. *Narrator:* Sena gently picked up Bobby.

## 2. Game: The Questionner

Children sit in a semi circle with one person - the Questionner - in the centre. The questionner asks someone a question.

When he answers, he must answer truthfully, but not use the words Yes or No. Anyone answering Yes or No must then say what value is in the question e.g. Walking to school is good exercise (right conduct).

The Questionner then asks the next person a question, and so on.

The questions must be kept coming quickly.

Decide how many questions you want the Questionner to ask before you change and another person goes in the centre and becomes the Questionner.

## Example questions:

Did you get up early this morning? Did you walk to school this morning? Did your mum bring you? Have you a brother or sister in this school? Will you play football at the weekend? Are you feeling in a good mood this morning? Is the sun shining? Do you have school dinners? Are you a vegetarian? Do you sit near the teacher in class? Do you wear school uniform? Do you like designer clothes? Do you recycle what you don't need? Do you have a pet? How do you care for it? Have you any Wellington boots? Have you ever been to the seaside? Can you swim?

**Close the lesson**: If the teacher wishes, the lesson can be closed by asking the children to form a circle and say, "I will be kind in how I treat others."
