FIRST AID

The scene is set at Peter's home and work.

Characters: Narrator

Peter Father Tom

Peter: I'm having a great time at college. I'm studying electrical engineering. I get to go out a lot with my mates - drinking, smoking and clubbing.

Father: As you've got plenty of free time, I would suggest that you take a First Aid course. It will help people and could save their lives.

Peter: You must be joking, Dad. I don't want to waste time doing extra courses. You do make me mad! After all, you're only young once!

Narrator: One day, after Peter had left college, he was working in an engineering company and was involved in wiring the premises. He had undertaken this work on numerous occasions and was always careful and efficient. On this particular day, however, his mind was preoccupied. He had had a row with his girlfriend the evening before and was finding it difficult to concentrate. Suddenly his drill touched an electrical mains cable. Peter fell to the floor, quivering.

Tom: What was that noise? Oh my goodness! It's Peter. Now what did they say on that First Aid course? I'd better switch off the mains supply quickly. Then gently pull Peter away from the dangerous cable by his clothes. He appears to be in shock. His face is ashen and he has severe burns on his body. He is breathing okay. His heartbeat is there all right and he has a faint pulse. I just need to get him into the recovery position before I call the emergency services.

Narrator: Peter was taken to hospital where he made a full recovery. When he was dismissed, he was extremely grateful to his colleague, Tom, who had saved his life by his quick actions.

Peter: Dad, I'm sorry I didn't listen to you before. Now I realise the value of your words and I'll enrol on a First Aid course. Maybe one day, I can do the same for someone else as Tom did for me.
